Textbook

A first course in graph theory by Gary Chartrand and Ping Zhang.
Other materials will be distributed as necessary.

Course Topics

Structural and extremal properties of graphs. Topics are selected from: trees, networks, colorings, paths and cycles, connectivity, planarity, directed graphs, matchings, Ramsey theory, forbidden structures, enumeration, applications.

Homework

There will be 13 homework assignment. To compute your final homework score, your lowest of these scores will be dropped and the remaining 12 scores will be averaged. Assignments will be posted to the course webpage and are due on **Tuesdays** by the end of class (the only exceptions being the first week and the week of the midterm). If you are unable to attend class on the day an assignment is due, you are responsible for emailing your assignment to me: this email must be in my inbox by the end of lecture, and your submission *must* be a **.pdf** file.

I will post homework solutions to the course webpage Tuesday afternoons. These solutions will be password-protected and I will share with you the credentials on the first day of class. If you forget the credentials, please send me an email.

Homework exercises are an essential part of this and any course. It is difficult to fully understand the material without working through the homework problems in a thoughtful manner, especially since this is an

accelerated summer course. Homework is especially important as this course will build upon itself, so if you lack the understanding of a certain topic, this will make understanding later topics more difficult. Take ample time to think about the problems posed, your strategies and the validity of your logic and explanations.

I encourage you to collaborate and form study groups. Learning collaboratively opens your mind to new ideas that you may not have considered and also forces you to clarify your own ideas. Nonetheless, copying any part of another person's homework is not permitted. To avoid what I could consider to be plagiarism, you must not write your assignment during collaborative sessions, but do so alone once your mind is clear. Not only will this help prevent cheating, it will also help you better understand the material.

Late-Work

Late submissions, be they in-person or by email, incur a 1% (as in percentage point) penalty per **minute** of being late, e.g. an assignment submitted at 12:27pm which would have received an 80% will instead receive a 68%.

Exams

There will be two exams in this course: a midterm and a final. The final exam is essentially just a second midterm in that it will not be cumulative. However, this is a bit misleading since the course will build on itself. That is, while the final exam will not explicitly test you on topics covered in the midterm, it will not be possible to pass the final without understanding and using the material covered in the first part of the course.

For each exam, you are permitted (and encouraged) to bring one standard 8.5×11 sheet of paper with notes. These notes *must* be handwritten and can take up both the front and back of the paper. You are not permitted to photocopy any other person's notes, but you may, of course, collaborate with others on what to include. Besides this sheet of notes, you are not permitted to use any other materials on the exam beyond your own smarts.

The midterm will take place on **Thursday, March 10** during the normally scheduled class time, and the final will be scheduled by the University Registrar's Office. The time and location of the final exam will be communicated to you once it is scheduled.

Makeup Exams

The Mathematics Department has very specific guidelines regarding the opportunity to make-up an exam. The categories designated by the [Faculty Handbook](#) (section 10.4.3) and requiring official documentation are:

1. Extracurricular activities as a representative of ISU.
2. Military service.
3. Officially mandated court appearances.

At the discretion of the instructor and with official documentation whenever possible, the other potential situations for a make-up exam are:

4. Medical excuse.
5. Family emergency.
6. Religious observations and practices.

Participation

On **Feb 3, Feb 17, Mar 8, Apr 7, Apr 21** and **May 5** we will have discussion sessions. On these days, the first half of class will be a normal lecture but the second half will be set aside for a group worksheet (except for Mar 8 and May 5 where the entire class will be a discussion session). You will break into small groups to work through questions related to everything that we have recently covered in class. These worksheets will not be graded, but they will give you the opportunity to discuss the material with your classmates and with me.

Your participation in these discussion sessions constitutes 6% of your grade: 1% for each session.

Beyond the discussion sessions, participation is strongly encouraged at any and every other time. Time will not allow me to regularly check attendance in this class; however, it is expected that you will attend class regularly. If you do miss a lecture, you are responsible for learning the materials you missed on your own.

I ask a lot of questions during class and will want to hear your thoughts and ideas. Don't hesitate to go for it! If you have any questions during lecture, please interrupt me and ask. It is very possible that I have made a mistake, or at the very least, very likely that someone else has exactly the same question as you do.
